Throughout this trying year, we were continually humbled by the support we received from our community in the form of donations ranging from meals to masks, toys and games for patients.







Pediatric Allergy and Immunology program highlight

A letter from our first greater Charlotte-area allergy and immunology specialist, Dr. Rajani

I am honored and proud to be the first Novant Health allergy and immunology specialist in the greater Charlotte area. I came from University of Rochester Medical Center in Rochester, NY. I graduated fellowship in July 2018 and got to spend more than a year as an assistant professor in pediatric allergy and immunology at University of Rochester Medical Center/Golisano Children's Hospital. I was fortunate to be able to help grow the clinical program there as well as take an active role in fellowship education. I served as principal investigator on a clinical trial for food immunotherapy and was a sub-investigator for other cutting-edge clinical trials for food immunotherapy.

While food allergy is my passion, allergy and immunology as a field covers a wide breadth of diseases. I follow children with atopic dermatitis (eczema), contact dermatitis, asthma, allergic rhinitis, stinging insect allergy, food allergy (IgE and non-IgE mediated food allergy, such as food protein-induced allergic proctocolitis (FPIAP), food protein-induced enterocolitis syndrome (FPIES) and eosinophilic esophagitis (EoE), drug allergy, urticaria and angioedema, anaphylaxis, eosinophilic gastrointestinal disorders, immunodeficiency, chronic sinusitis and nasal polyps and mastocytosis. Currently, in my office, we are able to perform skin testing (to foods, aeroallergens and medications), aeroallergen immunotherapy (allergy shots), patch testing, food challenges, medication challenges and pulmonary function tests. I also offer biologic therapies such as omalizumab, mepolizumab, benralizumab and dupilumab for asthma/chronic urticaria/atopic dermatitis. My hope is to one day grow the program to be able to offer venom immunotherapy (including fire ant immunotherapy, though fortunately venom immunotherapy is not generally indicated in the pediatric population unless there is history of anaphylaxis, which is rare), and hopefully sooner, food immunotherapy. Also, regarding immunodeficiency, it would be beneficial if at some point we could develop an infusion center in pediatrics where children could receive IVIg therapy if needed, which is generally a small subset of patients.

Food immunotherapy specifically is a hot button topic these days. The first-ever, FDA-approved food immunotherapy by Aimmune has become available this year for peanut allergy. It is now in the market. However, food immunotherapy has been offered off label for many years now. There are many physicians who have been providing therapies for various foods, including milk, egg and wheat, for many years and there are safe protocols available that could be implemented. My plan would be to start with the FDA-approved peanut immunotherapy and go from there. This does require frequent visits and a lot of close follow-up and provider availability, so this program can be established as we grow the clinic. It is important to note that food immunotherapy is not a cure for food allergies, rather a way to improve quality of life and anxiety surrounding food allergy by raising the threshold over which anaphylaxis would occur with an accidental ingestion by providing a small, quasi steady state dose of food in the diet on a regular basis.

My dream would be to one day be a nationally recognized FARE (Food Allergy Research and Education) Clinical Network Center of Distinction, which we would qualify for as a clinical care center that recognizes that we provide exceptional patient care and community education while generating real-world data through daily clinical care. We are probably a few years away from this, but I think it would be achievable as we grow!

Allergy and immunology is a field with active research and new and exciting treatments around the corner. Biologics have changed the way we treat asthma, and now even atopic dermatitis. It is a constantly changing field and I am excited to be a part of it and to bring my expertise to children in the Charlotte community!

NICU updates

Level 4 NICU with 38 licensed beds

Novant Health Presbyterian Medical Center is home to a Level IV neonatal intensive care unit with availability and capability to provide comprehensive complex care to infants born at 22 weeks and later, inclusive of respiratory, metabolic, surgical and neurological conditions. The unit serves as a tertiary center for other area hospitals unable to provide the level of care these infants require. It takes an army to care for these fragile infants and the unit proudly houses that army. Medical direction is given by a team of 11 neonatologists and 25 neonatal nurse practitioners. Over 140 specially trained nurses and CNAs, along with respiratory therapists, physical therapists, occupational therapists, speech therapists, dietitians, medical social workers and chaplains make up the rest of the team.

In 2019, 830 infants received care in our NICU. The unit's average daily patient count was 56 with an average length of stay of 24.8 days. Some infants require months of hospitalization before they are ready to graduate to home. It is not uncommon for more than half of our NICU infants to be on respiratory support, with 15 to 20 infants on ventilators at any given time. The team's focus is not only on the medical needs of the infant but also the emotional needs of their families. Our team members support parents as they navigate difficult days and celebrate the good days with recognition of the milestones that their baby achieves each day.

We implemented the **Neonatal Therapeutic Hypothermia Program** for Neonatal Encephalopathy in 2018. We have treated a total of 11 babies to date. This program allows for rapid treatment to minimize brain injury in infants, which increases their chances for survival without neurodevelopment impairment. This program also allows our neonatal transport team to start this treatment during the transfer of infants born at outlying hospitals so they can get care faster.

We have implemented a new approach for treating infants born with **Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome** (NAS). This approach, called **Eat, Sleep and Console**, is for babies who are withdrawing from opioids after delivery. We began the program in June 2020, and it has shown a significant decrease in the need for pharmacologic interventions. The program focuses on other measures to provide comfort for these infants. We have also seen a significant decrease in length of stay (LOS) for these infants — decreasing LOS from approximately 21 days to five to 10 days.

Needs for the coming year

We were able to meet the need to obtain a Glidescope that will be used in our NICU to assist with intubations. Intubations are a very challenging procedure both for the baby and the clinician. The Glidescope will allow for a more controlled procedure with an increase in success rates.

We still have an outstanding need for an ultrasound machine for our NICU to allow for easier placement of percutaneous central lines, as well as assisting with basic bedside procedural guidance and evaluations.

We also need additional beds to provide adequate room for the growing patient projections in our census.



PICU and pediatric updates

Life-threatening illness and injuries do not discriminate based on age. With an average of 500 annual admissions, our pediatric intensive care unit offers lifesaving medical care to some of our sickest patients. This all-private, eight-bed unit is located within the walls of Novant Health Hemby Children's Hospital and is a vital part of the remarkable care offered to any patient that walks through our doors.

Both inpatient and outpatient sedated procedures can be performed in the PICU's two dedicated procedure rooms. The near 400 sedations performed annually can include things such as lumbar punctures, bone marrow biopsies and hearing screens. Our PICU is staffed by some of the most skilled experts in the region including intensive care doctors, specially trained nurses, respiratory therapists and other healthcare professionals. Our staff of child life specialists are trained in the developmental impact

of illness and injury and are available to address the emotional, developmental and cultural needs of each family. The providers include nine pediatric hospitalists, four advanced practitioners and three pediatric intensivists. The PICU is equipped with necessary technology such as ventilators, respirators, brain pressure monitoring, continuous video EEG monitoring, ultrasonography for procedures and dialysis.

Alongside all of these extensive resources, the intimate size of the PICU unit allows families to receive individualized care while facing some of the most severe and life-threatening injuries and illnesses. We offer a compassionate environment that will encourage and empower families to take an active role during their child's stay. Our leading-edge facility offers large, private and family-friendly rooms to support direct family involvement in the care of PICU patients.

Through your support, 2020 brought essential pieces of equipment as well as other upgrades that will improve our patients' experiences using various funds dedicated to pediatrics. We are so thankful for our donors who continue to support our young patients by ensuring that we have the most up-to-date equipment and developmentally appropriate support items to provide remarkable care each day.

The Hemby Children's Fund was created to benefit programs and staff of Hemby Children's Hospital. This year that fund was able to do just that by providing pediatric friendly radiology updates. The radiology department is an area of the adult portion of Presbyterian Medical Center that many Hemby patients have to visit. These age-appropriate updates will help children feel more at ease while they go through their procedures.

The Dorothy Shelton Fund provides support for special needs, sick and injured children. This fund was able to provide Medkin dolls, which are medical dolls used by our child life team for therapeutic play and diagnosis education.

The Shelby Mitchell Fund which strives to provide patient care, research and educational support was able to provide a great deal for our patients this year. Five new iPads were purchased for our Pediatric Emergency Department.

Patients who visit our Pediatric Emergency Department will be able to use these iPads for distraction and play through therapeutic applications. Lastly, we purchased essential clothing items that are consistently needed.

Daniel's Pediatric Fund was able to provide essential items currently needed for our inpatient rehab patients, as well as items that have been recommended to families for home that they had to purchase in the past.

A great need was filled for our PICU patients with the purchase of a new ultrasound machine by the **Gupton** Pediatric Fund.

Our NICU team was able to purchase 16 syringe pumps which are used to feed our tiniest patients using The Intensive Care Nursery Hemby Fund.



Blume Family Playground

Within the walls of the St. Jude Affiliate Clinic at Novant Health Hemby Children's Hospital, Novant Health team members work together to provide remarkable care, along with emotional and spiritual support to children with cancer and blood disorders and their families.

Over the last two decades, Hemby Children's Hospital has treated thousands of children, and is a beacon of hope that began with a 5-year-old girl named Sherri Blume. In 1967, Sherri was in treatment at Presbyterian Hospital for a metastasized brain tumor. Although she lost that courageous fight, her family never forgot the kindness of the staff and how they were welcomed with open arms. They stayed in touch with Sherri's care team over the years and as the Blume family business prospered, Sherri's parents knew they wanted to give back.

A tradition of giving began, as the Blume family brought presents, paid medical bills and offered comfort in any ways they could to patients and their families.

That generous spirit continues to this day with the Blume Family Playground. This Foundation-funded initiative will renovate an existing 3,971-square-foot covered play area located at the front entrance to Hemby Children's Hospital and will be easily accessible to all rooms.

With an "under the sea" theme this space will provide an exciting, colorful and developmentally appropriate play space for patients to use while staying in the hospital.

The playground will have wheelchair access, many climbing structures and musical elements. Some of the eye-catching pieces include a large pirate ship, a tunnel, a yellow submarine and numerous sea creatures, including a sea turtle, a seahorse and a starfish.

Children can experience the benefits of music by using the conga, chimes and cabasa. The flooring will be a durable poured material, displaying a colorful and engaging pattern to complement the theme. Additional updates will include new lighting, a decorative bird screen and a new, accessible restroom.

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The legacy of Caroline Comly



How one family turned a tragic loss into a mission to support physicians and families at Novant Health Presbyterian Medical Center

John and Ginny Comly met in Romare Bearden Park, back when it was a gravel parking lot. John was leaving work late. Ginny had just gone for a swim at the gym and couldn't start her car. "I wasn't exactly a knight in shining armor, but I was someone with jumper cables," John recalled with a laugh.

In the years since that chance encounter, John and Ginny have built a life together. Their son, Robert, will be 11 in September. Their daughter, Katherine, turns 9 that same month. And this fall, they will honor the memory and legacy of their daughter, Caroline, with the opening of Caroline's Corner within Novant Health Presbyterian Medical Center.

"One of the important things for me, and the reason I want it to be called Caroline's Corner, is that, in 20 years, people will still be saying her name. To me that's an important thing," John said. "I also hope it will take little things off people's plates, both the caregivers and their families. I hope it will make their experience less trying than it already is."

Unfortunately, it's an experience the Comly family knows well. Baby Caroline was born four weeks early, in January of 2018. Despite arriving sooner than expected, she was happy and healthy. Two days after she was born, she was able to join her brother and sister at home. Then, one Sunday, Ginny had trouble waking Caroline to feed. After driving her to the Novant Health Hemby Children's Hospital Pediatric Emergency Department,

Caroline was transferred to the pediatric intensive care unit (PICU). Ginny and John didn't know what was happening, but tests eventually diagnosed Caroline with an extremely rare condition — bacterial meningitis. Caroline was put into a medically induced coma as the medical team worked to find a way to fight her illness. Further testing revealed the situation was far worse, however, and five days after she came to the hospital Caroline passed away.

In the wake of tragedy, it can be hard to find meaning. But the Comlys have found it, in part, in serving those who served them during the toughest time of their lives. John and Ginny were so moved by the work of Caroline's care team, they wanted to make their lives and work easier. After seeing firsthand that staff had no dedicated space to recharge, they built one within the pediatric intensive care unit. There's a couch and a TV, a coffee maker and a computer. It's a simple, dedicated space for the people who do so much for the patients and families in the PICU.

"I think for all the positive stories they get to experience, there's so much heartbreak," John said. "Their job is as much of a calling as anything else. You think about people who run into harm's way. These people aren't running into battlefields with bullets, but they're running into the most painful emotional environment every day with the hope of fixing a few of them, and that's pretty special."

But helping the caregivers wasn't enough. The Comlys' experience in the PICU showed them all the issues that families face when medical crises hit. To that end, the Comlys have spearheaded the construction of Caroline's Corner, a dedicated space within Presbyterian Medical Center for families with loved ones in Hemby Children's Hospital. When it opens this fall, this renovation of an existing



1,100-square-foot observation unit will feature comfortable seating, TVs, work stations, food service, a shower, laundry — everything families need when they can't go home because their loved ones are fighting for their lives. Through a partnership with the Ronald McDonald House, the Family Room will be staffed with dedicated volunteers and will offer programming to families such as visits with therapy dogs and evening activities.

"What we really wanted was just a peaceful place that had peaceful colors — to make it warm, comfortable, as much like home as possible," Ginny said.

"I was thinking about a way to make it not feel like a hospital, but to make it feel like a place where your mind could take you somewhere peaceful."

That mission is reflected in the tagline for the space: "Care, comfort and hope."

"That's what we view as the ultimate goal, because having a child in the hospital is a life experience where there is little, if any, comfort and hope," John said. "When Caroline died, it became more of a mission that we wanted to do this and to do it in her name. And this can hopefully be

part of a number of legacies that she's able to leave even though she's not with us."

Those legacies are taking shape at home, too.

"We always celebrate her birthday. She's interred at our church, and we'll go there as a family on Sundays and holidays," John said. "Her room is no longer a nursery, but it's a bedroom and sometimes the kids sleep there at night. There's a garden outside the window of her room that we put together in her honor, and we hang her stocking at Christmas."

All of that helps keep Caroline's memory alive and well, just as Caroline's Corner will when it opens this fall.

"It really has been part of our grief process," Ginny said. "There is an outlet there that takes a little bit of the tragedy away and helps us create something beautiful and hopeful and comforting."

Novant Health Huntersville Medical Center is bringing pediatric care close to home

Thousands of children in the Lake Norman and Huntersville communities require some level of urgent care annually, yet their residents have limited access to nearby emergency services. To address this growing concern, Martin Truex Jr. and Sherry Pollex partnered with Novant Health to introduce the Martin Truex Jr. Foundation Children's Emergency at Novant Health Huntersville Medical Center. This new state-of-the-art facility will be the first children's emergency department in the Lake Norman-Huntersville area.

Children have unique needs — from properly sized medical equipment to extra reassurance when things get frightening. It is important for them to be treated by physicians trained in pediatric emergency care in an environment designed with kids in mind.

The Martin Truex Jr. Foundation Children's Emergency will be staffed with physicians and nurses who specialize in caring for kids. This facility will also staff a child life specialist to better meet the needs of our smallest patients. Additionally, our new pediatric emergency department will include:

- Nine private treatment rooms
- Triage room
- NASCAR-themed, family-friendly waiting room
- Advanced medical equipment specifically designed to treat children
- Family consultation room
- Flat-screen televisions
- Treatment room for minor emergencies
- Sleep chairs for late-night emergencies




Our child life specialists work to reduce stress and trauma in clinical settings for children and their families. Stress and trauma can affect the development, health and well-being of children and family members as well. A family-centered approach is used to address children's social and emotional needs. Child life services can support families in the following ways:

- Age-appropriate preparation before treatment and information about a diagnosis
- Sessions to help a child play through medical experiences while in the hospital
- Coping plan for an upcoming medical experience
- Support and distraction during procedures
- Information regarding sibling responses to hospitalization
- Grief resources for families who have lost a loved one

The Martin Truex Jr. Foundation Children's Emergency is a critical long-term strategy to create a healthier community. Philanthropy is required for initial construction and retrofitting costs. Community Care Cruiser program

Childhood immunizations and annual flu shots are critical tools needed to get many children ready for school.

The Novant Health Community Care Cruiser partners with community centers, schools and the public health department to provide school-age children with vaccines and referrals for school entry physicals. Uninsured youths 0-18 receive free immunizations at community sites, specific middle school clinics and flu vaccine clinics.

Started in 2007, the Community Care Cruiser program, housed within Novant Health Community Engagement, addresses a community health concern: lack of access to immunizations that causes students in low-income areas to miss critical school enrollment deadlines, which in turn could impact their long-term health, continuing education and upward mobility.

In 2019, the Community Care Cruiser team members administered approximately 4,157 immunizations to 1,166 youths. The program also assisted in providing flu vaccines to the children's parents by way of private grants and donations.



Novant Health Charlotte Marathon

Since 2004, the Novant Health Charlotte Marathon has donated \$169,447 to the Novant Health Hemby Children's Hospital child life program, and in 2019 their impact continued with a \$30,000 donation, plus an additional \$7,732 raised through online event registrations.

These gifts have helped support the program's greatest needs and patient programming items and supplies to help make the hospital feel a bit more like home for the children — from arts and crafts to movies, wagons and toys.

In 2020, funds supported Caroline's Corner, a new kitchen and family living room for patients and families at Hemby Children's Hospital. Caroline's Corner brings care, comfort and hope to families with a hospitalized child. The spacious area creates a private and peaceful retreat uniquely designed to meet the needs of pediatric patients' families. This newly completed area is now available to make every day spent at the hospital a little more comfortable, enabling families to focus on their child's healing and recovery.

Due to COVID-19 the 2020 Marathon was a virtual race.









Our role as child life specialists is to help patients and families cope with the fear and anxiety that may result from coming to the hospital. We are working together with other child life specialists across the nation to develop resources to support patients, families and healthcare workers as we navigate this significant life experience together. We have created books, flyers and other visual aids, including uplifting messages written in chalk on the sidewalks surrounding our facility, to help explain COVID-19 in ways children can understand. We also have developed tips and suggestions to help children and families cope during this challenging time.




Refueled by CLTStrong

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The story of 'Sweet Baby Luke'

After the most difficult day of their lives, this family is on a mission to support Novant Health Hemby Children's Hospital

His name was Luke, but more often than not, his family didn't call him that. The 1-year-old boy with the infectious smile and joyful personality was better known as "Sweet Baby Luke."

"We would call him that because he was so wonderful and sweet all the time. He loved people and dogs and playing with his brother. He was an absolute joy," said Arliss Day, Luke's mother and store manager of the Kendra Scott jewelry store in SouthPark mall.

Then, one day in December of 2019, Luke had to be rushed to the emergency room at Novant Health Mint Hill Medical Center. One moment, he had been laughing and dancing; the next, Day and her family were watching Luke fight for his life.

"He was happy and healthy," Day said. "As we anxiously waited in the ER to figure out what was going on, we had no idea we would later be saying goodbye to Luke."

The medical team admitted him immediately, working feverishly to determine what was causing Luke's rapid and devastating decline.

"He passed away in my arms, and they revived him,"
Day said. "The entire emergency room team was at the
door with us. They were doing everything in their power
to help us, but nobody knew what was wrong."

Soon, the family was transferred by ambulance to Novant Health Hemby Children's Hospital Emergency Department, where they met Dr. Emily Nazarian and the team of medical professionals who would be there with them through the most difficult day of their lives.

"We knew they truly loved Luke. They asked what he liked to do, what his personality was, and we appreciated that they never gave us false hope," Day said. "They were very upfront with what was happening, but they delivered it in such a sincere way and they were there for us as much as possible."

The doctors were eventually able to pinpoint what was happening to Luke: He had volvulus, a twisting of the intestines more common and treatable in newborns. It is rare in children Luke's age, and four hours after he was rushed to the ER, it took his life.

"We never had to leave Luke's side. I was able to stand over the hospital crib and hold his hand and kiss his head. They could have easily sent me out to the waiting room, but they never did. They let me continue to love on him," Day said.

The past few months have been hard, to say the least, but Day has found bright spots. Kendra Scott gave her three months off after Luke passed away, and she threw a fundraiser to help cover some of the family's expenses. Day and her husband have a 3-year-old son named Adam, and as he adjusts to his new reality, he has taken to making LEGO creations to leave next to Luke's grave every time the family visits.

The family is also turning its energy toward giving back. Day and her husband, Kelvin, have started the Luke Day Foundation to help other families who lose a child unexpectedly. And they want to continue to honor and recognize the staff at Hemby Children's Hospital.

That work began in January. Day was eager to show her support and gratitude to Dr. Nazarian and all the nurses who had cared for Luke and her family, so she worked with her team at Kendra Scott to orchestrate a delivery of lunches and jewelry, giving each team member in the pediatric intensive care unit (PICU) a piece from the Kendra Scott collection.

"It was a bittersweet day. I didn't know if I would make it through the doors of the PICU," Day said. "When we showed up, we saw so many familiar faces. They told us this wasn't necessary, and we said, 'Yes, this isn't even enough.""







Kendra Scott has since made Hemby Children's Hospital part of the Kendra Cares program, which brings the company's signature Color Bar to pediatric hospitals to allow patients and families to design their own complimentary pieces of jewelry. And, in light of the COVID-19 pandemic, Day is planning a return trip to the hospital to deliver lunch and Kendra Scott face masks during Nursing Team Member Week.

"I think about them a lot. I pray. They're the true heroes in it all, and I know it's not easy for them. They all have families of their own, as well. Being able to balance that, it's really hard, and they are put into such difficult situations. My heart has gone out to them. You worry about them," she said.

Day has also been working with Kendra Scott's nonprofit partners to orchestrate other events to benefit the team at Presbyterian Medical Center. Typically, the Kendra Scott location in SouthPark mall hosts five philanthropic events per week. With the pandemic, those events have all been canceled, but Day has been working with organizers to take them from in-person to virtual and to have the proceeds benefit frontline healthcare workers.

"We have a lot of things in the works, and hopefully we can gear it all toward the Novant Health Presbyterian Medical Center Foundation and have a big give after all of this," Day said. "The team at Hemby Children's Hospital made the most horrible situation that anyone could possibly go through bearable for me and my family. They're there for a reason. We look back, and we look at Novant Health, and we're just thankful."




- A handicap-accessible children's playground at the Novant Health Hemby Children's Hospital campus

- An interactive discovery center waiting room in Novant Health's Center for Pediatric Development

Anyone who donates \$1,000 or more is recognized as a Superhero of the Children's Trust. Superheroes have the opportunity to vote on Presbyterian Medical Center Foundation funding opportunities and are provided with a dedicated phone line maintained around the clock by nurses who can answer questions or recommend specialists. "With over 50% of the children seen at the Center for Pediatric Development on Medicaid, the financial support from the Children's Trust has been crucial in providing better nonmedical care for these pediatric patients," McKinney said. "With the support of the Children's Trust, our team stands ready to support a family through any obstacle, from general counseling to extensive physical and occupational therapy."

For Cornelson and other trust members, the Children's Trust has been an opportunity to help build a safe and loving community at Novant Health with all the amenities a child needs to feel comfortable during a challenging time. "Everybody wants the absolute best for their child," Cornelson said. "It's so important that we offer that same experience for every child, no matter what their resources are or where they come from."

2020 Hemby Hero

Meet 'the mayor of the PICU' at Novant Health Hemby Children's Hospital

On June 26, 2019, 6-year-old Cole Joseph Russell got sick. Things went from bad to worse fast, and Cole was rushed to the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit at Novant Health Hemby Children's Hospital, where doctors told his parents the boy would need emergency surgery.

"We knew it was very, very serious," Cole's mom recalled.

Over the next seven months, one surgery turned into 12. Cole had suffered a volvulus, or a twisting of intestines, and a loss of bowels. He also had a stroke while he was in the hospital and, for a time, couldn't move the left side of his body.


Through all of that, Cole kept fighting — his spirits staying high. He got a breathing tube and quickly learned how to plug it up and create funny noises to tease the medical staff. He'd show off his dance moves — particularly "the floss." He'd build Hot Wheel car ramps and engage in Nerf gun battles in the halls of the hospital.

"We called him 'the mayor of the PICU," said Dr. Emily Nazarian, a pediatric critical care physician at Novant Health. "Cole wins your heart whenever you see him."

These days, Cole is home with his family and back to his old self, his mother said. He plays sports, jokes around with his brother and is doing better than anyone could have imagined.

"Our family will forever be grateful for Novant Health Hemby Children's Hospital and everything they did for our Cole," his mother said. "I can't imagine taking him anywhere else."

The core purpose of the Novant Health Center for Pediatric Development addresses the problem that children with disabilities have complex medical needs and often have multiple healthcare appointments in myriad locations. The center's goal is to provide everything these children need under one roof, with less time spent traveling and more time spent receiving care. The center provides an opportunity for providers and care teams to work together — in one location — communicating and building on each other's work in order to create innovative healthcare approaches for our patients and community. Anticipated outcomes of the unique structure of the Novant Health Center for Pediatric Development include:

- Increased number of children screened for early toxic stress
- Increased number of children receiving care for adverse childhood experiences
- Efficient processes to connect patient to therapies and community services in a timely manner

Novant Health Center for Pediatric Development opened in the second quarter of 2020 and is the full-time home of Novant Health Developmental and Behavioral Pediatrics and Novant Health Pediatric Rehabilitation, which includes audiology, occupational therapy (OT), physical therapy (PT) and speech therapy. Additionally, community partners, including Alternative Behavior Strategies, will co-locate in the building. In addition to PT, OT and speech therapy, pediatric subspecialties such as pediatric neurosurgery provide rotating support.

The new center includes four core service areas comprised of multidisciplinary clinics:

- Adverse childhood experiences
- Attention deficit hyperactivity disorder and learning differences
- Autism
- Developmental delays and follow-up from the NICU
