

We also provided lunch and dinner for many of our teams at our hospitals and screening centers.

Long before the pandemic intensified the spotlight on health disparities, our organization had been working to close health equity gaps and address social determinants of health in the communities we serve. In our COVID-19 response, we took swift action to look after our most vulnerable populations.

Your commitment to our foundation has also helped us distribute thousands of free masks in our communities, deploy mobile health units to bring critical services to underserved areas, provide multilingual educational resources and ensure every person who needs to be tested or wants to be vaccinated can count on Novant Health. We know there's more work to be done, and we have prioritized creating equity as one way we can improve the health of all communities, one person at a time.

Thank you for your ongoing support of our team, our patients and their families. COVID-19 won't define our lives forever. As we look ahead, our focus on providing equitable care to everyone will ensure a brighter future for all we serve.






## Hope for Remarkable Team Aubergine Fund

(Novant Health COVID-19 Diaster Relief Fund)

Almost as quickly as Novant Health team members responded to the pandemic, our community rallied to support them. Novant Health Foundation quickly established the Hope for Remarkable Team Aubergine Fund (formerly the Novant Health COVID-19 Disaster Relief Fund) to provide assistance for our team members. The fund also offered a way to get personal protective equipment and other critical supplies into the hands of healthcare workers across our network, as well as medical equipment such as ventilators, telemedicine devices and tablets to help patients stay connected to their loved ones. When underserved communities needed additional screening centers, funds also supported and helped accelerate this initiative.



During the COVID-19 pandemic, Novant Health team members provided remarkable care to our communities, often while enduring their own financial hardships. The fund raised nearly \$13 million in gifts from Novant Health, our executive team, our team members and our communities, allowing us to support more than 10,000 team members with \$10.79 million in approved assistance in 2020 alone. Our mission continues today.



## James Blount serves hope, one meal at a time

When you walk into the kitchen of Novant Health Kernersville Medical Center, you might find a cup of coffee, a cookie or a sandwich. But if James Blount is there, you'll find something else when you need it most: a friend.



As a chef and a cashier, Blount greets every customer with a warm smile and a helping hand. Because many of his customers are patients and loved ones of patients, he knows they are often experiencing challenging circumstances, which, for some, could be the most emotionally trying time of their lives. Blount does what he can to get to know each person and make them feel at home.

"I have to make sure their experience is the best that it can possibly be. I need to talk to this person face-to-face, and I need to let them know I am here. Because when I'm there, Novant Health is there, too."

When the COVID-19 pandemic began, Novant Health leaders implemented heightened safety protocols, including reducing the cafeteria's access and hours. Just as all team members did, Blount understood and embraced the changes, but the impact on him was significant. He didn't know how he was going to pay rent.

But help was right around the corner. Blount applied for assistance from the Hope for Remarkable Team Aubergine Fund and received enough funds to cover his rent for a month.

"I am honored and grateful," he said. "One more month gives me a fighting chance. I can go to battle for one more month. I can make it."

## Virtual Garden Party raises \$62,000 to support new mothers

The Women's Council held a virtual version of its annual Garden Party, "Here Comes the Sun," in June and raised \$62,000 for Family Connects, a home visit program for new mothers in Forsyth and Davidson counties. It provides free, in-home visits from a trained nurse two to four weeks after the birth of a child and connects families with key community resources.

"The Garden Party was a success even though we had to take it virtual. We were happy with our Zoom turnout and thrilled to be able to help Family Connects." said Leigh Ann Janjua, Garden Party chair

## Creating **new opportunities** for the next generation of nurses

The Cindy Jarrett-Pulliam Nursing Excellence Fund provides financial assistance for Novant Health nurses in Winston-Salem. The fund was started in honor of Cindy Jarrett-Pulliam, a beloved nursing leader at Novant Health Forsyth Medical Center who passed away in November 2019. Recipients can use their awards for tuition, books, child care expenses, car repair or other personal needs while pursuing nursing education.

Four Novant Health team members in greater Winston-Salem received a total of \$25,000 to follow in Cindy's footsteps, including Brittany James, who is pursuing a nurse practitioner degree at the University of Cincinnati.

"I had the pleasure of working with Cindy for many years. Her leadership and dedication to nursing were always admirable. Even though she is no longer with us, her memory lives on. It is an honor to continue her legacy of leadership," said Brittany James.



## **Bud and Suzanne Baker** provide child care for team members



Bud Baker, former CEO of Wachovia Bank, and his wife, Suzanne, stepped up when the pandemic arrived in Winston-Salem with a gift of \$50,000 to support child care for Novant Health team members. Through a partnership with local YMCAs and Care.com, this generous gift allowed our front-line healthcare workers to focus on their important work, knowing their children were cared for and safe.

## **Memory Makers Cafe**



Dementia can be very isolating for both patients and caregivers. Memory Makers, a free monthly program for caregivers and their loved ones sponsored by Novant Health Forsyth Medical Center Foundation, offers a chance for participants to gather, make memories, laugh, connect and unwind. There is a structured program and time for caregivers to support each other during this challenging time.



## Finding purpose in a pandemic

Amid all the challenges in the fight against COVID-19, critical care nurse Amanda Chilton has been excited to see so many people unite to help others. Although she has shed some tears along the way, she is invigorated by what she considers her calling. In Chilton's eyes, the coronavirus has given way to a new way of nursing, in which healthcare workers have added even more heart to their profession. And the support she received from the community and from Novant Health has been profound.

"I'm very thankful for an organization like Novant Health that has gone above and beyond to make sure we're protected with proper gear and we've been fed. Even though times are scary, I feel very supported. It's been wonderful to see people come together," said Chilton.





## When the **challenges at home** meet the challenges on the front lines

Latazia Harris is a critical care assistant nurse manager at Novant Health Forsyth Medical Center. At the start of the pandemic, her unit began specializing in the testing and treatment of COVID-19, which put Harris on the front lines of a global pandemic. She is also a mother to a son with special needs. His name is Josiah. He has a tracheostomy and is prone to respiratory issues. And as the COVID-19 crisis began to take shape within the walls of her hospital, Harris had to carve out a plan — one that would allow her to do her job to the best of her abilities while keeping her son safe. The foundation heard her concerns and responded, using contributions from its Hope for Remarkable Team Aubergine Fund to pay for Harris's stay in a hotel while she worked so she could avoid putting her son at risk.



"To work for an organization that makes those resources available, it's definitely something that is appreciated because it alleviates some stress," said Harris. "And it continues to help us stay where we are, in the hospital, doing our jobs. It also speaks to one of the reasons why I chose to come to Novant Health: They appreciate their team members. And this is just another example of that."

## Silver linings in a 'baptism by fire'

Savannah Hayes graduated from nursing school in December of 2019. She completed her 12 weeks of training at Novant Health Forsyth Medical Center on March 12, and on March 13, 2020, she was assigned to one of the COVID-19 screening clinics. She called it a "baptism by fire" for her nursing career, and yet her list of silver linings is long. One man pulled up to the side of the clinic and held up a handmade sign that said, simply, "thank you." Churches brought snacks. Through gifts from the community to the Hope for Remarkable Team Aubergine Fund, Novant Health Forsyth Medical Center Foundation provided lunch for our testing team every day.



"We're a family. I look forward to coming here every day, no matter what challenges we face. It's rare, especially when something so stressful is going on. But everybody comes in and says, 'I'm so happy to see you today,'" said Hayes.

## Our nurse navigators in action

Nurse navigators support cancer patients and their caregivers through every stage of their journey, starting after a diagnosis. Doug Owen and his wife, Robin, know firsthand the impact of that work. Doug was diagnosed with parotid gland cancer in May 2019. After surgery to remove 44 lymph nodes, he started chemotherapy and radiation. Doug finished his treatment in September 2019 and received an all-clear scan in December. Meredith Smith, a head and neck cancer nurse navigator at Novant Health Derrick L. Davis Cancer Institute, was integral in helping them navigate their journey.

"It was really overwhelming at first. Meredith was there for us," said Smith. "Anytime I had a question about his treatment, I knew I could call her. Without her, I don't see how anyone could survive it. You don't know where to go, who to call, how to coordinate care."

Our nurse navigator program receives much-needed funding from the Smash Cancer Tennis Tournament, usually held in October. Organizers canceled the event due to the pandemic, but that didn't stop you from stepping up to support this vital program with contributions of over \$9,000. Thank you!

## Major milestones for maternal and infant health

Family Connects provides new parents living in Forsyth and Davidson counties with free nurse visits at your home. Its goal is to provide support for you and your baby while connecting you with resources that can help your family thrive. And in 2020, the Hearst Foundations awarded awarded Forsyth Medical Center Foundation a \$125,000 grant to support Family Connects.

"The Hearst Foundations are deeply committed to a safe, healthy start for children and their families, especially those who may not have access to the resources or services they need to thrive. We are pleased to partner with Novant Health to ensure the very best care for babies and their families from the earliest days of a child's life," said Hearst Foundations Eastern Director George Irish.

Since 2016, the program has provided support for thousands of mothers and babies and connected families to nurturing community resources.

**Mobile incubator:** In late 2020, Forsyth Medical Center Foundation funded the addition of a new mobile incubator. The incubator — a \$100,000 investment on the part of the foundation — can turn an ambulance into a neonatal intensive care unit on wheels and will turn Novant Health Forsyth Medical Center into a regional destination for neonatal care.

**Novant Health Today's Woman:** The events of 2020 highlighted the need for quality healthcare across our communities. At Novant Health, we have long been committed to health equity and providing remarkable care regardless of a patient's ability to pay. Since 2000, donations to Novant Health Forsyth Medical Center have supported Novant Health Today's Woman OB/GYN, a clinic that provides pediatric, obstetric and gynecologic services to women of childbearing age and children under 18 in our community. Thanks to your generous donations, our board-certified providers were able to continue offering remarkable care to every mother and child who came through our doors.



# Our new and improved Novant Health Cancer Institute at Novant Health Forsyth Medical Center

- \$5.6 million total cost of renovation
- Features:
  - Renovated infusion space designed to improve aesthetics, provide natural light and ensure patient privacy with 45 private bays.
  - Renovated gynecologic oncology area provides improved aesthetics and new exam rooms.
  - Donahue Developmental Therapeutics Unit The jewel in the renovation project, this unit provides patients with access to novel treatments available only in a few centers throughout the country. Patients who participate in early-stage clinical trials have advanced cancer and have exhausted all other treatment possibilities. These trials require close monitoring for potential side effects. Because of a generous gift from Dan and Kay Donahue, Novant Health is thrilled to bring a dedicated Developmental Therapeutics Unit to patients in our region.
  - Only 1% to 2% of cancer patients in the United States have access to a clinical trial, which is lower than the rate in other countries. Novant Health Cancer Institute aims to increase the availability of trials, which will lead to better treatment options for future cancer patients.



## **Stacy Sawyers** is paving a path to care for cancer patients in need

Stacy Sawyers is a cancer services support specialist at Novant Health Forsyth Medical Center's Derrick L. Davis Cancer Institute, and her job is to help patients overcome barriers to care, leveraging generous donations to provide the financial support necessary to push them forward in their cancer treatment journey.



The Rebekah Fund, established in honor of Dr. Dawn Moose, provides patients access to critical dental care.

"As staggering as this sounds, it is very easy to see a \$10,000 or more bill for dental services. I have one patient who showed me his bill, and it was over \$27,000. The average is \$15,000, and there is a minimum of 12 patients each year who will need this money," Sawyers said. "It is certainly an under-met need."

Last year, Sawyer met a 72-year-old patient with metastatic breast cancer. The woman couldn't start a medication that would ease her pain and help her bone metastasis because it would deteriorate her jawbone. The patient needed nine teeth pulled but couldn't afford it. Sawyers sent the patient to a dentist, who pulled the teeth and made it possible for her to begin taking the medication that will strengthen her bones and improve her quality of life.

And when the \$2,600 bill came, Sawyers covered it with donations from the Rebekah Fund.

"When we told the patient, she cried. She couldn't believe that someone would do that for her," Sawyers said.

## Making **great strides** for mammogram access in our region

In recent years, Forsyth Medical Center Foundation has been working diligently to increase access to mammograms across our communities. We know mammograms can help catch breast cancer early. We also know that early detection gives patients a better chance at long-term survival. And yet many individuals in our community lack access to this lifesaving screening.



With all of that in mind, Forsyth Medical Center Foundation kicked off an appeal in October, National Breast Cancer Awareness Month, to raise funds specifically to ensure more individuals across our region can receive mammograms. And our donors responded with profound generosity: In total, we raised \$40,000 for this initiative, which will go a long way toward improving the health of our communities. Thank you!

## From volunteer to patient to donor for Forsyth Medical Center

Claudia Zorn Schaefer has long been an ardent believer in supporting her community. Her passion led to a role serving on Novant Health Forsyth Medical Center Foundation's board. Through her service, Schaefer grew acquainted with Novant Health physicians and other team members, and she enjoyed spreading the word about Novant Health to others.

In 2019, however, her life took an unexpected turn, and it inspired her to take her support to the next level, making generous donations in honor of those who cared for her during her time of need.

It began with a dry cough that persisted day and night. A few weeks later, she developed abdominal pain and other unusual symptoms. After a CT scan, doctors told Schaefer she had advanced non-small cell lung cancer, as well as peritoneal cancer, which is similar to ovarian cancer.

During her weeklong hospital stay, Schaefer said she felt more and more at ease as she realized she had Novant Health's "A-team on my side."

She began chemotherapy treatment at Novant Health Derrick L. Davis Cancer Institute in August 2019 under the guidance of oncologists Amy Wallace, MD, and Demetria Jacks, MD. When she began losing her hair, she selected a soft knitted cap from the basket of beautifully crocheted hats made by community volunteers. After eight cycles of chemotherapy and surgery in July 2020, Schaefer received wonderful news: She was in full remission for both cancers.



Schaefer continues to have frequent appointments at Derrick L. Davis Cancer Institute to monitor her blood work, meet with her oncologists and get periodic scans. She enjoys seeing team members, from Rayvon Mitchell, the curbside assistant who greets her at the front door, to the check-in staff, nurses and doctors. And Schaefer continues to give to honor them and their work.

"Remission from advanced-stage cancer is no small thing," Schaefer said. "However much more time I get, I'm grateful for the tremendous care I've received. Whatever happens to my health in the future, I know that my A-team at Derrick L. Davis Cancer Institute will see me through, both physically and emotionally. That gives me great comfort and allows me to enjoy the good health I have today."

## **Grants**

## North Carolina Healthcare Foundation

The North Carolina Healthcare Foundation (NCHF) awarded Forsyth Medical Center Foundation a \$149,975 grant for a COVID-19 hospital preparedness program. This funding supports the urgent preparedness and response needs of hospitals, health systems, and healthcare workers on the front lines of the COVID-19 outbreak. Thanks to NCHF grant support, Novant Health's Digital Health and Engagement team is providing remote monitoring equipment to certain COVID-19 acute care discharge patients, along with high-risk pregnancy and postpartum patients as part of COVID-19 preparedness measures. This program was supported by the Department of Health and Human Services Office of the Assistant Secretary for Preparedness and Response under federal award number U3REP200659. ## Nurse home visits funded for Forsyth and Davidson County families and newborns
