




Hope for Remarkable Team Aubergine Fund

(Novant Health COVID-19 Diaster Relief Fund)

Almost as quickly as Novant Health team members responded to the pandemic, our community rallied to support them. Novant Health Foundation quickly established the Hope for Remarkable Team Aubergine Fund (formerly the Novant Health COVID-19 Disaster Relief Fund) to provide assistance for our team members. The fund also offered a way to get personal protective equipment and other critical supplies into the hands of healthcare workers across our network, as well as medical equipment such as ventilators, telemedicine devices and tablets to help patients stay connected to their loved ones. When underserved communities needed additional screening centers, funds also supported and helped accelerate this initiative.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, Novant Health team members provided remarkable care to our communities, often while enduring their own financial hardships. The fund raised nearly \$13 million in gifts from Novant Health, our executive team, our team members and our communities, allowing us to support more than 10,000 team members with \$10.79 million in approved assistance in 2020 alone. Our mission continues today.

Where the rubber meets the road

Riders Against Cancer, a special group of women who are motorcycle enthusiasts and healthcare advocates, continued their efforts to raise money and awareness for breast cancer prevention. To date, their annual Riding for Mammograms poker run has generated more than \$50,000 in donations. Through our partnership and their fundraising, we have funded mammograms for more than 100 women.

Even though Riders Against Cancer had to postpone their poker run due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the community stepped up and donations still came in from merchandise purchases and sponsorships, totaling \$13,070. An anonymous donor stepped in to match 50 cents to every dollar, which increased their monies raised to \$19,065.

Introducing the new Cancer Survivor Fund



For 39 years, Rick Parker dedicated his career to improving healthcare for others and connecting generous donors to Novant Health's mission to deliver remarkable care throughout the communities it serves. During his tenure, he served as executive director for Rowan Medical Center Foundation, directing all fundraising and community activities.

"The healthcare industry is one of the most cognitively stimulating industries in the world. It's just a

fascinating business. I truly woke up every day excited about coming to work because there are many different opportunities to keep you motivated, both intellectually and emotionally," Parker said.

To honor Parker and his work and continue his commitment to healthcare in our community, we launched a new Cancer Survivor Fund. Because fighting cancer often creates financial strains for patients and families, the Cancer Survivor Fund will provide financial assistance to cancer patients receiving care at Wallace Cancer Institute. The fund will help these community members cover the cost of necessities such as housing, utilities, transportation and nutritional supplements.

"I always thought, if I got to the end of my life and I was asked, 'Were you able to help one person and expect nothing in return?' would I be able to answer that question? I can answer 'yes' now."

The power of food in a time of need

Good food brings people together. So does the mission of saving lives. In 2020, law firm Wallace & Graham, PA, found an innovative way to combine

the two while supporting local Salisbury restaurants.

Last year, Wallace & Graham, PA, in Salisbury, provided regular lunches for team members conducting drive-thru COVID-19 testing at the respiratory assessment center at Novant Health Rowan Medical Center. The meals came primarily from small businesses in downtown Salisbury. In total, the gift came to more than \$10,000.

Defying the odds

When Bradley Hill was born, doctors told his family he wouldn't live past the age of 5. He was born with spina bifida, which occurs when the spine and spinal cord do not form properly in the womb. He also had a cleft palate and lip and hydrocephalus, more commonly referred to as water on the brain. His prognosis, doctors said, wasn't good.

Since then, he's had over 75 surgeries. He has a shunt in his brain and a rod in his back. And he has defied the odds: On Sunday, April 26, 2020, he celebrated his 19th birthday.



Although Hill has far surpassed expectations when it comes to his health, he still requires a great deal of medical care. His family had large quantities of medical supplies on hand at the start of the pandemic — some of which they knew they would not need and therefore would be better served protecting doctors and nurses on the front lines. The stockpile included boxes of sterile gloves and catheter kits, which each contained a few pieces of personal protective equipment. So Hill and

his family donated extra medical equipment to Rowan Medical Center in Salisbury.

"He's the sweetest boy ever with the best outlook on life," said Sarah Sweatt, Hill's cousin and a professor in the department of nursing at Catawba College in Salisbury, North Carolina. "He likes helping people. He was happy those supplies could be used instead of staying in storage."

Tanya Blackmon, executive vice president and chief diversity, inclusion and health equity officer

On diversity, inclusion and equity: "I did not want to be a figurehead in this position. If we're going to do this, we're going to go big and implement in a way that truly added value," Tanya Blackmon said. Her subsequent approach



and leadership have yielded tangible results. Case in point: She heard from more than 700 team members across all levels of the organization over the course of a systemwide tour. On the tour, Blackmon learned that the executive team at Novant Health did not reflect the workforce across the system. While the workforce was 82% female, there was only one woman serving on the executive team. Four years later, those numbers have transformed dramatically as Carl Armato, Novant Health's president and CEO, wanted

to ensure that he had multiple perspectives represented. Today, 40% of the executive team are women, and 40% are people of color.

On remarkable health equity: "It's patient-centered. So, we listen to the voices of our patients. It's affordable. So, we take care of people who cannot afford to pay for their care. And it means you're going to get the highest quality of care, no matter what," Blackmon said. "Health equity is about recognizing both the visible and less visible characteristics of diversity of people, understanding their unique needs and providing the best care for each of them."

On social justice: "It takes courage to take a stand as an organization. When Novant Health published our position on '*Black Lives Matter*', that was courageous," Blackmon said. "We said we exist to save lives, all lives. We said we believe that Black lives matter. We said if society isn't healthy, no one is healthy. And we said we have zero tolerance for racism, and I think it was very bold and very appropriate that we did that."

Ophelia Garmon-Brown, MD, Novant Health senior vice president and chief community health and wellness officer

On remarkable health equity: "We really do have to do things differently for different types of people," said Ophelia Garmon-Brown, MD. "A lot of times our healthcare providers will say, 'I treat everybody equally.' But equal care may not be what people need because those who have not had access to care for a long time may need things done differently to achieve health equity."

On serving others: "A dollar, if that's what you can do, is wonderful," Garmon-Brown said. "But it's not just about your money. It's about your time. It's about your talent. Whatever you have a passion for."

On teamwork: "I have been amazed at how many of our team members come to work every day and give remarkable care but are struggling: struggling to pay the rent, struggling to have transportation, struggling to get their food, struggling in so many various ways ... This is not a corporate push. This is a human push. This is a teammate push. This is a community push. Because we know, as we push together, we can push ourselves up an incredible hill and make a difference in the lives of others."

Infection prevention specialist Jessica Ramey


Jessica Ramey worked in infection prevention for Rowan Medical Center when the COVID-19 pandemic hit. To help meet the challenge of the new and challenging reality, Ramey got to work building her own face shields. She went to the craft store and bought what she needed to construct a few prototypes. In a short time, she'd built a few new face shields by hand, and they worked.

Ramey knew she was going to need more. She also knew she would need help. She found it in a group of volunteers at Memorial Baptist Church in Kannapolis.

Ramey sent them the schematics and the supplies she'd purchased and gave them strict guidance on how to keep their manufacturing process safe for themselves and for the healthcare workers who would receive the face shields once they were complete.

"And they've been cranking out face shields ever since. We tried them here at Rowan Medical Center first to make sure they were safe, and it was really a blessing for us. The face shields help protect our masks and allow us to wear those masks longer. The team really values having them."

The final phase of construction on the Wallace Cancer Institute at Rowan Medical Center took shape in the thick of the COVID-19 pandemic, but it didn't slow us down one bit. The Wallace Cancer Institute opened Aug. 12, 2020 — on time, despite everything.

This 32,000-square-foot, state-of-the-art cancer treatment center brings together cancer experts, leading-edge technology and resources designed for ensuring patient comfort and healing, all in one location.

Features and services:

- 20 private infusion suites where patients receive chemotherapy in a peaceful environment equipped with specialized chairs to maximize comfort
- Conference suite for community education and clinical team collaborations
- Access to groundbreaking clinical trials
- Aluminum sculpture entitled "Rising Phoenix"
- The Hurley Healing Garden, a tranquil outdoor space featuring plants, flowers and rock water fountain.
- Access to an oncology dietitian
- Nurse Navigators
- Genetic counseling
- Social services to assist patients with transportation and other needs
- On-site boutique offering specialized items such as wigs, scarves, mastectomy bras and prostheses and special clothing

The new institute is named in recognition of a gift from Salisbury residents, Lee and Mona Lisa Wallace, and came to life thanks to the generosity of over 1,300 donors.

Grants

The Kiser Fund

The Kiser Fund gave over \$1.1 million in grant funding to Rowan Medical Center in 2020. The purpose of the Kiser Fund is to honor the late Dr. and Mrs. Glenn A. Kiser and their commitment to Rowan Medical Center by funding programs to enhance patient care.

Each spring, departments within Rowan Medical Center submit applications regarding projects that will address patient needs, ranging from exercise equipment and upgrades to a new trauma operating room. The Novant Health Rowan Medical Center Foundation's Kiser Fund Committee then accepts applications for funding without preference to any one department or service line.

In 2020, eight different patient care areas received Kiser Grants totaling \$1.1 million:

- **Cardio-pulmonary rehabilitation:** exercise equipment replacement and inspiratory muscle trainers
- **Behavioral health:** patient iPads for connectivity, sensory cart, and unit engagement programs to create a warm and welcoming environment
- Surgical services: endoscopy and urology upgrades
- **Newborn nursery:** Panda Warmers for newborns
- **Rehabilitation:** Repex table to assist with movement of patients
- **Radiology:** SonoSite X-Porte and echocardiographic upgrades
- Trauma services: team education
- Facility: replacement of heart defibrillators
